In accordance with our Constitution (18.3), "At each annual general meeting of the association, the members of the management committee [including the president, vice president, treasurer, and secretary] must retire from office, but are eligible, on nomination, for re-election."

Nominations are therefore sought for the following positions:

- Secretary
- Treasurer
- not more than eight regular Management Committee members

If you would like to put up your hand for the committee, here's how:

- You need to be a current member.
- You need two current TM Landcare members to nominate you.
- Your nomination must be in writing, signed by you and those who are nominating you.
- The form must be given to the secretary at least 14 days before the AGM (i.e. received no later than Friday 15th November.)

Our Current and New Projects

As well as maintaining our numerous Council reserves and parks, we are focusing on several key projects.

Sports Grounds/Parkrun Track



Trainee bushcare regenerators have been hard at work on two key areas of the Sports Grounds. The area behind the cricket oval, once completely covered in invasive morning glory, has now been planted with local species that will encourage wildlife. The team have have also cleared weedy vegetation under the large pine trees along the front fence line.

West Road to Hartley Road Corridor

Contractors are working to remove rampant small and large leaved privet trees, Chinese elm and asparagus fern and to restore native vegetation along the bank of an important little creek which joins up with Cedar Creek, behind the Winery.



Biddaddaba Creek Heritage Reserve

With an eye on the bigger environmental picture, we are giving a helping hand to the Biddaddaba Creek Action Group. Close to Canungra, this beautiful valley in Boyland has a small creek running through farming properties and flowing into the bigger Canungra Creek. The group was formed many years ago, but now are struggling to find funding to eradicate weeds along the creek. Our Management Committee has decided to offer a small amount of funding towards contractor work. We will assess the results after a few months. New signage was installed near the creek, which we hope will encourage the local landholders to undertake weed control on their own properties
